FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK:

Prayers 4 a Holy Week!

During Holy week, Christians are called to set time apart in worship and reflection on the events in the life of Jesus as he walks obediently to face a death that will bring about salvation to humankind. The Holy week was filled with many activities including Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem and his teachings about the kingdom of God.

Holy Thursday, the day of the Passover meal, Jesus wanted to spend this last evening with his closest friends, the ones who had traveled with him and ministered with him for the last three years. As his disciples begin to argue over greatness, Jesus teaches them humility by washing their feet. He then shares the last meal with them, setting apart the bread and the wine to symbolize his broken body and shed blood while charging them to do this to remember him whenever they gathered. We remember this time in our Maundy Thursday services where we participate in foot washing and communion.

After the meal, Jesus and the disciples leave to go up on the hill where Jesus begins to pray for the steadfastness of his disciples and the unity of all his followers as well as for Himself. That was when Judas shows up with the temple army to complete his betrayal of Jesus. Jesus is taken in front of the court, falsely accused and convicted, and turned over to the Roman authorities where he is beaten and crucified. Christians celebrate this day as Good Friday. Jesus dies that day at the moment of the slaughtering of the Pascal lamb and He is lowered from the cross and buried.

Holy Saturday, the day of darkness when Jesus is in the grave, has for centuries been a day of prayer in Christendom. In the early church, the entire congregation would pray throughout the day and through the night until the celebration of the resurrection at sunrise Sunday morning.

Today, many congregations practice a tag team of prayer as people come to the sanctuary to pray one at a time, a half hour or so each so that prayer is being lifted up throughout the day and night. Some churches open their doors for people to come by and pray at their convenience. Regardless of the tradition, this Holy Saturday is a day to be set apart to pray and reflect on the obedience unto death of Jesus Christ.

Holy week events triggered the most important event in all of human history; the salvation of humankind in the death and resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ. It is a holy time, a time set apart wherever we might be, whatever we might be doing to remember the events that gave us new life in Christ.

Wishing us all a holy and blessed Easter!

FOOD PANTRY

I am a little disappointed that our wall of veggies has not grown since we took some of the veggies to the food pantry. We made a push for veggies because Judy Eyer, director of the food pantry, said that was something they needed. What she didn't say was that veggies were only needed right then. We all know that veggies are an integral part of the diet, so let's continue to build the wall bigger than ever and continue our support of a vital ministry within our community. And, of course, the pantry can always use other pantry staples like soup, canned stew, small canned hams, pasta and sauce.

FOOD STAMP CHALLENGE

Last month there was a challenge to people to try to live within the allotted food stamp budget of \$29.86 per week. Besides myself, one other person took the challenge and she has admitted that she was surprised that, even with her planning and frugality, she failed to meet the goal. Her expenditures totaled \$58.56 – almost double the allotted amount. She stated, "Fresh fruit (apples, oranges, bananas) is costly. The only way I can think of saving in that area is to eat only one-half of a piece at a time. I made soup twice during the week, which was good for 6 servings. I stretched 2 chicken breasts as far as possible by using them in soup and stir-fry. I incorporated rice and beans to stretch meals. After thinking it over, I could have done without my sugar-free foods for



the challenge, but these are items I would not want to give up forever. This challenge has made me extremely aware of all those who suffer from hunger every day and has pushed me to give more." Awareness of any social issue is a positive step but, if we don't act on our awareness, we are not doing the work of the Lord.

Despite the typical awkward years of middle school and high school, I found a constant in my life: I gravitated toward music as my escape from my feelings of loneliness, mistrust, and hurt. I was singing and creating tunes to distract myself from understanding those experiences. Failed grade-school friendships, disintegrating familial relationships could have put me on a painful path, but something or someone kept me going back to the arts. Music essentially got me to college.

After high school, I found myself leaving the only community I had ever known. I found myself in Rochester attending a private college in a completely foreign community. I was happy studying music; happy enjoying meeting new and different people, but the concept of diversity and multiculturalism became real to me – something else was missing. I missed the concept of home; I missed my family; yet, I believe something or someone kept me in Rochester getting my education. I found myself returning to my roots. I formed new relations and learned new perspectives on history and Native American history as I changed my area of study. The relationships I formed while studying history led me to becoming more involved in campus ministry.

Any type of faith structure or belief was never a constant in my life. I never really had faith in faith. Campus ministry introduced me to being a part of the body of Christ – a limb I could really grasp at this time in my life. I was rediscovering myself culturally and spiritually, and breaking down, piece by piece, any walls I had built up. I kept hearing about how, often times, college leads many away from church. I thank campus ministry, as well as my college experience – one full of love and acceptance – and my own patience to embrace the situation God had put me in, for allowing me to learn about the Light inside of me that had been trying to break free. That light broke through when I attended my first Student Forum through the General Board of Higher Education Ministries (GBHEM) in 2009. To be continued...

The following is Josh Mattice's open and honest response to a request that he share some thoughts about his faith. We hope there will be more sharing, youth or adults, still to come.

BEING A FAITHFUL TEENAGER IN 2014 by Josh Mattice

Today, we live in a society that is fundamentally different from what it used to be. The advent of liberal reforms in society, while Christian in nature, propose a detriment to classical religious practices. I, as a teenager in 2014, deal with the noticeable progression of a strong atheist/agnostic/unaligned movement. I face many rebuttals for my religious choices; and the fact that I am open enough to discuss them, often leads to sneers or the disregard of my opinion on matters. Even though it is my duty as a Christian to make God's word available to all who will hear it, I cannot force them to listen, even many of my close friends. I see that I am one of only a few people who remain steadfast to their religion, inside and outside of school. I have chosen to ignore the doubts that the world puts on me, through people and through classes, for the sense of completion that faith brings me.

As a science student, I am told of the random chances that occurred for us to develop as we did. There are no allowances for religious attitudes in a classroom setting, and the ideas behind agnosticism inadvertently take precedence. While it may sound less faithful than I intend it to, I do not align with Christianity because I know that God exists. In truth, none of us knows. I have chosen to devote my mind and heart to His purpose because I believe that He does. I have a strength of belief that many in my generation have lost. I rely on the safety of a God whom I can count on to protect me. While others deny Him because of a "lack of proof", and their inability to believe in something intangible, I believe because I would be lost in the world without His light. I need to believe that God is real because the alternative, an existence devoid of purpose, is a concept that I cannot cope with. I am faithful because it is my faith which drives me to be better, to help others. My faith is not casual, my faith is not convenience. My faith is necessity.
