

Update on 'Rethinking Syracuse Methodism'

The 'Rethinking Syracuse Methodism' effort has been blessed so far with tremendous participation from each of our eight Syracuse churches. The effort has allowed us to start to come together in some new ways as we consider our future together. This article provides a brief summary of activities so far, and a quick look forward.

The Leadership Team created as part of the effort started to meet during May. The team includes laity from each of the eight churches, our clergy team, our District Superintendent, and Rev. Lauren Swanson who is acting in a consulting role. The team is working together to understand and navigate through the change which is upon us now, in the form of a new structure and new appointments. Soon, the team hopes to also begin considering where God might be leading us as we plan for the future.

The team met twice in May. So far the focus of our meetings has been on understanding and preparing for the new appointments and the more team oriented approach our clergy will be taking starting in the summer and fall. Each of our churches will begin to see multiple clergy in their offices and in their pulpits starting this summer. Some churches will also see a change in schedule as we accommodate pastors who will be preaching at multiple locations.

Two Working Groups established by the Leadership Team will start meeting within the next couple of weeks. The groups will be starting to look at Missions and Nurture. Early on the Missions Group will help us find some simple ways to bring us together as we serve Syracuse. Eventually, the group will develop a larger strategy for Missions and Outreach in our city. The Nurture Group will also start finding some ways to bring us together for worship and fellowship opportunities while beginning to develop plans for the future in these areas.

Looking ahead, here are some things that can be expected from the 'Rethinking' effort in the near future:

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- The Leadership Team will develop a clearer understanding of how we operate in the structure created by our new appointments. The appointments have us continuing as independent churches while working together in a new structure. The Leadership Team hopes to clarify how the new clergy structure will work with our still independent churches.
- 2) The infrastructure will be developed to provide improved communications. We hope to have a web site in place by the fall which will start by providing information on our 'Rethinking' process itself. It is our hope that this site will grow to something which brings a new sense of connection to our churches by providing information about worship, programs and missions. We also expect that weekly worship bulletins and monthly newsletters will start to contain more collective information.
- 3) The Working Groups will provide some opportunities to come together in mission, worship, and fellowship – We hope to start intentionally coming together in small ways, to build connection as we continue to plan our future in these areas.
- 4) We will all start to see emerging plan for our future The 'Rethinking' effort will ultimately need to consider where God is leading us in order to serve our city and nurture our faith communities. Developing a successful plan will continue to depend upon our



churches, working groups, leadership teams, and our clergy coming together in faith as we consider our future.

Please keep the City of Syracuse and our 'Rethinking' effort in your prayers. Coming together and finding a path forward is difficult, but filled with opportunity. May God give us the faith to make some difficult but necessary changes, and the wisdom to understand His will for us as we journey together.

FOOD PANTRY

We need to keep building our wall of veggies. It has not grown much since we took some of the veggies to the food pantry. And, of course, the pantry can always use other pantry staples like soup, canned stew, small canned hams, pasta and sauce and paper products: toilet paper, tissues, paper towels, etc.

ANNUAL SPENDING BY FAMILIES WITH CHILDREN UNDER 18

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, families receiving public assistance spend on average less than half as much as families that don't receive public assistance. For instance, in recent testing of spending patterns, families not receiving public assistance spent \$9,539 per year for food whereas families receiving public assistance spent \$6,460 for the same period. Families not receiving public assistance spent \$22,833 on housing while those receiving public assistance spent \$11,835. Those not on public assistance spent \$11,249 for transportation and those on public assistance spent \$5,271.

Considering those very moderate figures, it's safe to say that most of the folks receiving public assistance are *not* on welfare for selfish personal gain, but because they actually *need* the support. These numbers also prompt important questions about opportunity in the U.S. For example, families that don't receive public assistance spend an average of 382% more on insurance and retirement than families that rely on public assistance. How might a family's ability, or lack thereof, to invest in the future impact economic mobility for their future generations?

Numbers aside, instead of pointing fingers at poor people and spreading false generalizations about them, wouldn't we be much better off working together to ensure all families have a fair chance at healthy, productive and fulfilled lives?
