

### FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK:

Effective July 1, six pastors have been appointed to the City of Syracuse United Methodist Church by Bishop Mark Webb. Rev. Craig French is the team's coordinator and others on the team are Revs. Patience Kisakye, Doug Mackey, Caroline Simmons and E. Chip and Lillian Owens. Rev. Lauren Swanson will serve as a coach for pastors and lay leaders and will be part of the preaching rotation during the summer before he heads to his new appointment in Penfield on Sept. 1. The Owenses will be on board Sept. 1. In addition, a parallel group of pastors will be assigned to Syracuse to start new churches and ministries aimed at reaching a variety of ethnic groups and age groups not found in the existing eight churches.

<u>Rev. Dr. Patience Kisakye</u> has 26 years of service between the Methodist Church in East Africa and the UMC in the U.S. Currently appointed to Bellevue Heights UMC. Background in education, specialties in African and European history accredited by Kyambogo School of Education in Uganda. Master of Arts in Religious Communication from United Theological in Dayton, Ohio; Master of Divinity from Garrett Theological Seminary in Evanston, Illinois; Doctor of Ministry from South Methodist University's Perkins School of Theology.

<u>Rev. Doug Mackey</u> completed his seminary studies at Drew Theological School, after 30 years as an archaeologist, and was commissioned as a provisional elder in 2013, hoping to be ordained as an elder in 2015. Currently appointed to Rockefeller UMC, active in supporting the ministries of The ROAD, working with the CNY-HIV Care Network and serving on the Bishop's Task Force for Discussion on Sexuality. Served as Licensed Local Pastor at First UMC in Schenectady where he was introduced to urban ministry. Married to Sherri, daughters Alexandra and Alyssa and son Mike. Enjoys reading, getting involved with important issues and sports of all kinds.

<u>Rev. Caroline Simmons</u> graduated from Colgate Rochester Crozier Divinity School with a Master of Divinity degree. Upon graduation from CRCDS, she served part-time at Fowlerville UMC while also working part-time at Asbury First UMC in Rochester. She served Emmanuel UMC in Lockport for three years while working to be commissioned as a provisional elder in the Western NY Conference. She served a two-point charge at Little Utica and Warners and, in 2010, was ordained at the first gathering of the Upper NY Annual Conference. Currently serves Collamer United Church and St. Paul's UMC. Enjoys scuba diving, is a former instructor, and has an Australian Shepherd/Border Collie dog named Kelsea.

Looking ahead, Caroline said, "In simple terms, I believe that God is calling us to be more than what we have been and do more than what we have done in ministry so far. It is going to be quite the journey, but worth taking the steps to travel together and grow in our faith and service to others."

<u>Rev. Craig French</u> majored in international relations and diplomacy at American University in Washington, D.C. and received his seminary training at Boston University School of Theology with a major in social ethics. The best years of his ministry have been spent in urban ministry in Buffalo and Syracuse (past 6 years) at University UMC. He has also served suburban and college town churches. He and wife, Barbara, have three grown children and are helping to raise two granddaughters, ages 9 and 4. When he is not driving the girls somewhere, he enjoys hiking, reading, kayaking, art, poetry, travel, SU sports and the Red Sox. Craig has long stated that, "If nothing is done to change the status quo, the end result is clear: one by one all of our city churches will disappear. Unsettling as these new plans and arrangements may be for current members, the goal (like a family intervention) is to bring health and wholeness to urban ministry in Syracuse, so that all may know life that is abundant, free and joyful."

<u>Revs. E. Chip and Lillian Owens</u> are 2014 graduates of Gammon Theo-logical Seminary on the campus of The Interdenominational Theological Center in Atlanta. He holds a B.S. degree in Communications Entertainment Media Production from the University of North Alabama and she holds a B.S. degree in Music Education from Alabama A&M University. They plan to continue their academic pursuits with doctoral degrees in the future. E. Chip published his first book in 2012 entitled "21 Days of Worship: A Devotional for



the Worshipper in You." The Owenses have a 1-year old son, Josiah. They enjoy reading, watching movies and playing music. They are both excited about their move to Syracuse.

<u>Rev. Lauren Swanson</u> has been in the United Methodist ministry since 1983. Studied philosophy at SUNY Fredonia and SU and graduated from the Iliff School of Theology. His continuing education has focused on congregational development and organization systems. From 2005 to 2010 Lauren served as Director of Congregational Development for the North Central New York Conference. He hopes that, as he works with the Interim Leadership Team, the District Superintendent and the pastoral staff of the city churches, a powerful new way of being God's church in Syracuse will emerge.

Descendants of the people who suffered from the sins of the past suffer today in varying degrees through historical trauma, societal breakdown and cultural genocide. I will try to capture more of the work we need to do as a community of faith and as individuals in the next two or three Signals. ### **A Spiritual Journey**

Three years into college, a lot had changed. I was in the midst of beginning my acknowledged journey of spiritual growth. I was able to meet and witness other Native Americans praise and thank God with every fiber of their beings, not just as His children, but as Native children. They were the Potter's creations being just who God made them to be.

As I finished my last two college years, I was presented with more opportunities to really grow and experience God's love, not just for me, but for the world. I helped lead the Protestant worship and I participated in service and mission trips.

The biggest mission I undertook was in 2010. I traveled with a group of 50 other young Native Americans across the Northwest and got a look into Native American ministry.

As young Native people, we ministered with other Natives and shared our "hope stories." We went to make and build relationships by sharing our experiences of the hope we found through the love of Jesus.

Through my mission and church-related events, I was able to reintroduce myself to music. Relating to others through our own personal struggles and joys of passion made all the difference in the world for me. These opportunities – particularly ones associated with the United Methodist Church, and because of the efforts of campus ministry – presented themselves as a platform for me to continue to share my journey and even affirm my faith. I was baptized and confirmed while at college.

### LOVE Offering

This year, as we prepare for the Fifth Session of the Upper New York Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church, we will be taking a special LOVE Offering on Sunday, May 25<sup>th</sup>. Every church is asked to help support ministries and missions here in our area, nationally and globally through this offering. This year, the offering will support various missions and ministries in our Conference through grants awarded by the Reaching Our Neighbors Ministry Oversight Team. In the past, these ministries were supported, in part, by districts in the predecessor conferences; that funding is no longer available. This offering will help restore our support of these valuable missions. Nationally, we will support feeding hungry people through *Stop Hunger Now,* which will be bringing their mobile food-prepping and processing operation to Annual Conference to help us package 75,000 meals while we are gathered together. And globally, through this offering we will help fund a scholarship to Africa University in Zimbabwe.

Camillus Erie Canal Park and Sims Store Museum, 5750 DeVoe Road, Camillus, is a 420-acre park open daily year round with free admission and parking. Many groups come by appointment to visit the museum and gift shop, take a narrated boat tour over the historic 1844 Nine Mile Creek Aqueduct and use the picnic area.
