From quiet hours and first beginning, Out to the undiscovered ends, There's nothing worth the wear of winning, But laughter and the love of friends.

Striving to win is not wrong unless we are wearing ourselves out attempting to win the wrong things. In America we have the custom of celebrating New Year's Day by watch-ing bowl games, a ritual of competition and the fight to win. Belloc advises us to strive rather to be victorious in winning the goal of "laughter and the love of friends." What better advice at the beginning of the new year to help us examine our priorities.

True friendship is a rare gift to win in our all-too-busy world, our lives overloaded with obligations and work. For friendship takes time and effort, requires creativity as well as that mortal sin of the assembly line, the ability to "waste time." Unless we are willing to waste our precious hours being in the company of a good friend, seeking nothing but the pleasure of another's company, we shall miss one of life's rarest gifts.

In olden days friendship was easier, for people spent most of their lives in the same village or neighborhood. Today our work causes us to frequently move from place to place and, with so much greater ease in mobility, it is commonplace to have a large number of acquaintances but few friends. While we often use the word "friend" even for people we have known for only a short time, it should imply a deep and profound sort of communion. Among certain tribes in Africa, when two friends ended a relationship, it required a formal ritual of divorce by the whole tribe. As in so many other matters, primitive peoples often had a deeper understanding of the realities of life than do we.

In reading the Gospels, it is clear that Jesus had both a profound respect for and personal knowledge of friendship. His use of the word implies the sort of bond which primitive peoples considered as sacred and secure as marriage.

This new year can be a fresh beginning, or it can be nothing more than an overlapping and extension of the past, where the only thing that changes is the page on our calendar. In these first new days of a new year, what better resolution could we make than to deepen our existing friendships into relationships of communion that are truly holy.

END OF 2016 FINANCIAL STATEMENT

2016 was a very good year for Bellevue Heights. For the first time in quite a few years, we were able to pay all our bills, including 100% of our Shared Ministry (formerly known as apportionments).

Our total income for the year was \$171,000. Our total expenditure was \$158,000, leaving us with a balance of approximately \$13,000 to begin the New Year.

In 2016 we also contributed over \$1600 to special benevolences, such as World Communion Sunday, One Great Hour of Sharing, Human Relations Day, Flood Buckets, several advance specials and several other causes.

On the expense side, we were blessed with a warmer than usual winter, saving us quite a bit of money. We were also able to accomplish some long-postponed maintenance. We were able to do some much-needed repair to the roof and also the trim on the exterior of the building was painted. Also, I am sure everyone noticed the improved landscaping around the building. This was all accomplished through your generous giving and is a wonderful example of what can be accomplished by a caring, energized congregation!
