#### **Stewardship**

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

The summer is over and we are well into the fall season moving toward winter. It is also that time of year when we focus more on the state of our giving – money, time, and other tangible gifts. This year we are happy to share with you that our stewardship campaign starts on Sunday, Oct. 23<sup>rd</sup>, through Sunday, Nov. 20<sup>th</sup>. Following is a brief insight from the author of the program we are using this year.

#### **Putting God First in Living and Giving**

Do we worship idols? The answer may surprise you.

During this year's stewardship campaign, we will hear about God's generosity and our response as we experience one stewardship program, *first: putting GOD first in living and giving*, developed by author and pastor, Mike Slaughter of Ginghamsburg Church.

We are made in God's image and are meant to be creators of life and hope, not the consumers of our culture's shiny gods. We have the ability to change the world and create a legacy that will live forever in the lives of generations to follow. That legacy starts when each of us takes the hard steps of financial discipline and fulfilling the call to generosity that God has placed in all of us.

The goal of this stewardship program is not to make you feel guilty, nor is it to say that you have to be exactly like this or that person. The goal is for all of us to ask questions of ourselves and be open to the possibility that God will lead us in new directions in our lives.

During the four-week program, we'll be challenged in a number of different ways. We'll be asked to look for the idols

in our own lives (Hint: Most of them aren't animals made of gold) and name the ways these idols enslave us, holding us back from living in the true freedom that God desires for us.

We'll be challenged to consider the place that money, work, and debt have in our lives. What are our common understandings of these, and might the witness of Scripture lead us to some different understandings?

We'll be challenged to ask ourselves what it means for us to be faithful, to save, and to give. How do we balance all the competing interests in our lives? What priorities does God want us to have?

Finally, we'll be challenged to give with our hearts, not out of obligation or a sense of duty and not just when we think the recipient deserves our gift. Instead, we'll be challenged to give the way God gives – freely, fully, with no favorites or expectations of repayment.



It is our prayer that, at the end of these four weeks, we will have begun to grow into the individuals and the church that God knows we can be. Please join us in *first: putting GOD first in living and giving.*

#### **THE HOLIDAY SEASON** (Edward Hays – A Pilgrim's Almanac)

Soon the holidays will be upon us. The holiday season begins with Thanksgiving and continues until Epiphany. It is a season filled with expectations and the richness of tradition. Our word holiday is but another spelling of "holy day." The idea of combining religious celebration and relaxation from work goes back to the origin of holy days – days of both attending church and freedom from work – because rest itself was considered holy.

We need more holidays! We need those days when we can pull out of the fast lane and rest a bit on the side of the racetrack of daily life. Long ago, Sundays were such days of rest from the labor of the week. They were observed with the same attitude as was the Jewish Sabbath, when even the beasts of burden were forbidden to labor. Today, such days of complete relaxation and rest are few and far between.

We each need to honor holidays or free days when we exercise the discipline of closing our eyes to the mess in the garage or to the closet that needs to be straightened, and just relax. Such days are holy days even if they fall on a Saturday, or some other day, and even if we are the only ones observing them. We need such days of freedom if we are to be holy and whole.

Part of our religious tradition is the keeping holy of the Sabbath. The requirement of abstaining from work was to be a weekly celebration for the Jews of their liberation from slavery in Egypt. Slaves don't have days off; so to have one free day out of every seven was a powerful statement about who the Jews were and who they were not. How easily we become enslaved to a host of masters who keep us "on the go" seven days a week. If it isn't one master who is cracking the whip, then it's another. They have names like efficiency, tidiness, success, achievement; as well as others we know so well: the boss, the business, the job. In addition, marriage, friendship and health all prosper when they are given holidays and free times. If our commitments are such that we consider an entire day an impossible reality in our week, then at least there is always the holy hour or "holihours" – a certain time each day to be free, to relax, and so become more holy. An entire holiday is better but, as the old saying goes, "A half a loaf is better than no loaf at all." And loafing is what holidays and Sundays are really about, even if we have misplaced their original purpose.

As we begin to prepare for the coming holiday season, we could apply some discipline to our agendas about what "should" be done. While decorating, purchasing gifts, writing cards, cooking grand feasts and attending parties is indeed part of the tradition of the holidays, so is loafing. Perhaps the best way to begin to prepare for the great holy days of this season is to put on your loafers and have a holiday or holihour today.

On October 11<sup>th</sup> I had the privilege of hearing Mary McClusky share her testimony. She walked haltingly into the room and sat in a chair facing the

audience. I noticed her feet which were in shoes that did not match in size. The left shoe was wider than the right and both shoes were so short I wondered how she managed to maintain enough balance to walk.

Mary was born in India and was left on the streets by her birth family to die when she was 3 or 4 years old. She was found by a man whom she thought was trying to protect her but he sexually molested her and threw her back on the street. Mary was wandering the streets, found herself at the train station, and was sucked under a train and her legs were severed.

Mary says, "Death was knocking at my door, but God held me in the palm of His hands." She was taken to a hospital where her life was saved along with one of her legs. She was sent to an orphanage and subsequently adopted by an American family.

In the words of my friend, Millie, "Mary's life story and testimony will almost stop you from breathing. Her story will make you ask, what do I have to complain about? You will look at her and wonder, how can she be so cheerful and full of life? Mary's true story will prove how God can take what was meant for disaster and turn the disaster into something of beauty."

1 Peter 5:6-7, "Therefore humble yourselves under the mighty hand of God, that He may exalt you in due time, asting all your care upon Him, for He cares for you." What I know for sure is that God cares for us intensely and His love for us is personal, detailed, and in-depth.
